

Library people pay property tax too

On a thought this morning, I've checked on my 2019 property tax statement: \$91.26 assessed for the library. Then, reviewed what I currently have out on my library account: 8 items at a total purchase (not list) price of \$158.00. I figure I'm getting a good deal. Over the course of a year I'm saving thousands of dollars by borrowing instead of buying, and I consider myself a fairly average user.

Consider a family with young kids: through the library they have access to several thousand easy readers, beginning readers, juvenile reading, board books, books on CD, juvenile DVDs (Frozen II coming soon!) games, nature kits, electronic learning kits, learning kits and toys, play food and a play cash register -- and much more.

Now a young family could go broke buying all of this -- or instead come to the library and borrowing this -- already paid for.

No one likes taxes -- but I'd suggest that with the library you're getting a return on your money that savvy Wall Street investors would appreciate.

Consider the library a book/DVD/book on CD/materials and goods co-op, because that what it is. Founded by local folk -- not government -- who had their own and community interests in mind.

Today, you can go down to the library and borrow (along with books, books on CD, DVDs, Blu-Ray, magazines) Colorado State Park passes, a child carrier, snowshoes, a humane critter trap, a DVD and Blu-Ray player, a laptop, computer tablet, book-loaded e-reader, and much more. We're scratching the surface.

If you currently don't hold a library card, come on down and check us out. We think you'll like what you see. And, you'll save money.

Diversity! Shouldn't there always be at least one contrarian...one that doesn't run with the herd?

Clearly, many have found diverse "treasures" at the RFL Community Library. I don't doubt the appreciation and genuine praise for the "beautiful gem."

It appears the library provides a literal cornucopia of entertainment and related items, extensively listed by Mr. Kidd. I never knew it was so diverse.

Some even choose to characterize the library in terms of savings and "investment," calculating their personal high return (ROI). I don't doubt that's the case for some.

However, I have a question. Since when was "founded by local folk" using the mechanism of property tax assessments—NOT government? Common sense leads me to understand that as an exercise in "local government." Am I wrong?

It would be interesting to know precisely how many property owners, as a percentage of the total, use the library and how often? Fair question? In this age of computers and technology, I bet those numbers may be available somewhere.

Don't misunderstand, my wife and I are bibliophiles and we've done a great amount of reading since childhood. We're firm believers in "life-long learning." However, many of the books we desire to read can't be found in smaller or even larger public libraries for various reasons.

Over the past 50 years, I've gone to local libraries to see if a title/author was available and the answer was "No," a huge percentage of the time. I gave up. Someone will respond, "Well, you should have filled out a request for the library to purchase what you want." That seems reasonable enough, but think about it.

Libraries have budget constraints (dollars are not unlimited, while some users and librarians might wish that wasn't the case) and the library staff acts as a type of filter for the process of deciding which requests and acquisitions have priority over others. Correct?

Consequently, we faced an early dilemma. Wait for the library to order (or not) a book we're specifically interested in reading OR search to purchase that specific book USED, or new if need be. I suspect authors appreciate that kind of decision due to what's called "royalties"—often the author's source of income. As you may or may not imagine, we own sizable personal libraries paid for with our own dollars. Pro-choice.

I'll end with a story you may find interesting. Several years ago, my wife and I listened to a fascinating radio interview between the host and a retired professor, who has authored several books. I won't mention his name. His subject(s) were controversial and from a point-of-view, a majority in today's world would classify "politically incorrect."

I was understandably skeptical I'd find this author at any local library. I did find a nice used copy (rare at the time) on Amazon for only \$5 plus shipping, a striking 3% of the new price at that time.

When the hardbound copy arrived, it was in good shape except for the big red letters "WITHDRAWN," stamped on the inside title page and all three edges. Clearly, strong psychological and emotional forces were at work to censor the book from the library's shelves.

My point is that even the most broad-minded of librarians have biases (subjective preferences) that filter the selection and disposal of books purchased with taxpayer's dollars for "public" consumption. I prefer the liberty to choose my reading material rather than have it pre-filtered by those who might think they know what's best for me to read. Sometimes things aren't what they seem.

Well, thank you, Dan, being contrarian leads at times to interesting, level discussions that often work well for everyone. Diversity is a valued factor in our community as well as on library shelves. We're not aware of any herds locally in any fashion.

I'm going to to try to assist with some of your questions, likely in snippets to avoid hard-toread lengthy posts.

There are some differences in terminology. We normally refer to the library cornucopia rather as being user and community responsive.

Certainly there's no cost-savings if a service isn't used. That's a personal choice. There are any number of items built into each Larimer County tax year assessment that I have little interest in and don't use. That in itself doesn't mean that funding or a given project isn't worthwhile or valuable to other residents.

Users. We tally use monthly. As of Feb. 1, there were 771 registered cards in zip 80545 and 583 in zip 80536 or 1354 altogether. At last calculation (2018) the Colorado State Library pegs District population at 1810.

However, a card doesn't necessarily mean one user. Some husbands and wives share a card: registered to Joe and Joan Blow. Some families rely on a single card for the whole family and same families rely on adult cards held by Dad and Mom.

So, there's variables in cards and card use.

With overall library use we counted 22,105 individuals using the building in 2019, excluding from that count staff and volunteers and folks in and out during a short period. Dividing that figure by the 356 days we were open in 2019 gives a pretty good average of daily count.
